Six golden rules for the composition of texts

1) Understanding the task

Read the task carefully.

A task often contains several <u>subtasks</u>: consider <u>all</u> the aspects mentioned and write them down as headings.

2) Keywords

Brainstorm as many ideas as possible and write them down as keywords.

3) Topical order and outline

- Put the keywords into topical order by giving them <u>numbers</u>.
- Find <u>categories</u> for your ideas/arguments/statements and appropriate <u>headings</u> for each category. They might coincide with the headings above or you might have to find <u>subheadings</u>.
- List the categories, including the keywords, in <u>numerical</u> or <u>chronological</u> order.

4) Paragraph(s)

Compose the text in paragraphs. The whole essay consists of

- a) an **<u>introductory</u>** sentence / paragraph
- b) **developing** sentences / paragraphs
- c) a <u>concluding</u> sentence / paragraph

Each paragraph consists of 5-10 sentences.

5) Textual coherence

Make sure that you guide the reader by using <u>link phrases</u> and <u>connectives</u>.

6) Corrections

Make sure you have enough time left to correct mistakes.
